

Academics stress on skills, education beyond theories at TOI conclave

Pune: Indian education must grow beyond the theoretical approach, Symbiosis Society founder-president S B Mujumdar said while addressing the Times of India Vice-Chancellor's Conclave here on Thursday.

Eminent speakers from various universities spoke on the importance of skills and the local-to-global roles of the universities in India. Panel discussions with the university heads were also held at the conclave.

Mujumdar, who was the chief guest at the conclave, spoke about the trends in education abroad and how all that could be replicated in India. He said, "I have spent decades in education and realized that education is like oxygen for the development of a country."

Mujumdar said that considering India will be an advantage because of its total population of 134 crore, around 65 crore (50%) were between the 17-34 age group of 17 to 24.

He said, "We need to tap this population at the earliest. If we can achieve that only through education, India needs more col-

to skills development as opposed to traditional education. That will transform our country."

Swati Mujumdar, pro-chancellor of the Symbiosis Skills & Open University (SSOUI), said, "I

believe skills training should be taken up on the national platform. South Korea has 90% skilled work force. But India has a very low percentage of people in skilled jobs. One of the reasons for the

skill-based education. Society has not yet accepted it. Students still prefer to go to medical or engineering courses."

Ajaykya D Y University director Hridaysh Deshpande addressed the issue of globalization in education in his lecture. "Higher education is not an option but a must to land a respectable corporate job. But just a degree is not enough. We need to reform higher education with new regulations. In changing times, we need to be prepared for a transformation in higher education," he said.

Vishwakarma University president Bharat Agarwal said that, "The vice-chancellor is one of the most important leaders in the education system. A vice-chancellor can change the course of education. The industry expectations are now getting more demanding. The education system must meet these expectations. It is important to bridge the gap between the industry and the academia."

After the inaugural session, the conclave saw three panel discussions with participation from various eminent academicians from different universities in the
